





- Time to get things cleaned up and put away!







Ohio




- We hit the jackpot on rain totals over the past weekend. While rains were somewhat spotty, we happened to be right under the "yellow" on the radar!


#### **GREG JANISCH FARMS**

## **Closing Comments**

Many of you recognize the name "Vin Scully". Vin was a long-time broadcaster, who became famous for the opening call of "It's time for Daaah...dger baseball!" He brought to life the first perfect game thrown in the World Series in the 1950s by Yankee pitcher Don Larsen. Perhaps he is best known for the iconic call of the World Series homerun hit by Kirk Gibson in 1988, saying "In a year that has been so improbable, the impossible has happened!" as an injured Gibson rounded the bases to seal a victory for the Dodgers.

It may be an exaggeration to say the "impossible" has happened in this week's Virtual Crop Tour; however, it is certainly not a stretch to call the events "improbable". Of course, I am speaking of extensive rains in parts of Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas. After suffering a debilitating drought that gripped the area for the previous year, parts of Kansas had up to 14 inches of rain in a single week. Not exactly the preferred way to end a drought, but the water was certainly welcome.

Conversely, it seems that a dry spell has started to establish itself in two of our four ASNA Virtual Crop Tour farms this week. The next two weeks will be critical, not only for these farms, but for the country's corn production. After a stellar growing season in 2022, things are starting to unravel with little relief in the 10-day forecasts within portions of lowa and Illinois. While a respectable crop can still be grown, it will take substantial rainfall in the immediate future, and the forecast does not look promising.

## **Closing Comments**

If you attended one of the winter meetings conducted by ASNA and your local agent, you will remember that we were not optimistic about long-term price forecasts. However, we did believe that June and July would present opportunities. Then and now, we continue to believe that we should take some type of action to take advantage of any marketing opportunities that June and July hold for us. It is important to remember that supplies look to be building due to several variables across the globe. Even if these opportunities pale in comparison to the markets of 2021 and 2022, we need to be cognizant that the balance sheet is changing rapidly and we must, at the very least, consider placing price floors on the crop at hand.

If Vin Scully were still around, his call on the markets might sound a lot like one he made during the 1986 World Series. As the Mets were down to their last out in Game 6, a slow roller was hit to the Red Sox first baseman. With near-certainty, the Red Sox were to be world champions. Of course, most of us remember that ball rolling right between the first baseman's legs. Scully exclaimed, "...you have seen an absolutely bizarre finish to Game 6 of the 1986 World Series. The Mets are not only alive, they are well...". The same could be said for our markets as we enter into a crucial two-week period!
